

East Riding of Yorkshire Adult Carer Findings From Census 2021

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- On Census 2021, those indicating they provided some form of unpaid care each week totalled 30,618 in East Riding of Yorkshire.
- Of this, 15,283 provided less than 20 hours unpaid care a week, 5,651 provided between 20 and 49 hours a week, and 9,684 provided 50 hours or more a week.
- Overall, this was a decrease in individual carers of 6,750.

Unpaid carer overall figures compared to 2011

- A decrease in the proportion of individuals providing unpaid care was seen nationally, largely driven by individuals providing more hours of care (in the 20 to 49 hours range mainly).
- East Riding also saw a slight increase in the proportion providing 50 hours or more, not seen nationally.
- ONS suggest other reasons for the decrease in individual carers:
 - Covid restrictions limiting travel and mixing.
 - Household mixing rules limiting carers who previously shared responsibilities.
 - A higher number of deaths than expected in the older population at the start of 2021.
 - Changes in the wording between 2011 and 2021 Census impacting self-reporting of unpaid care.

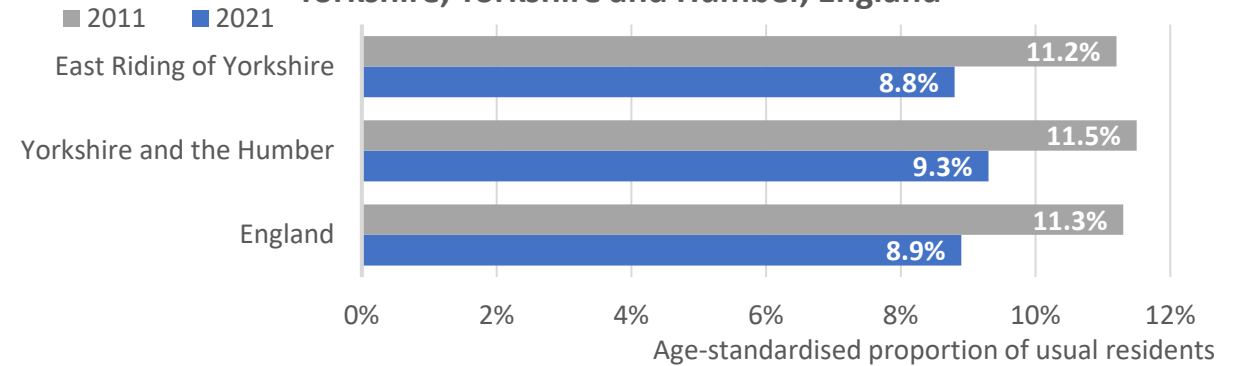
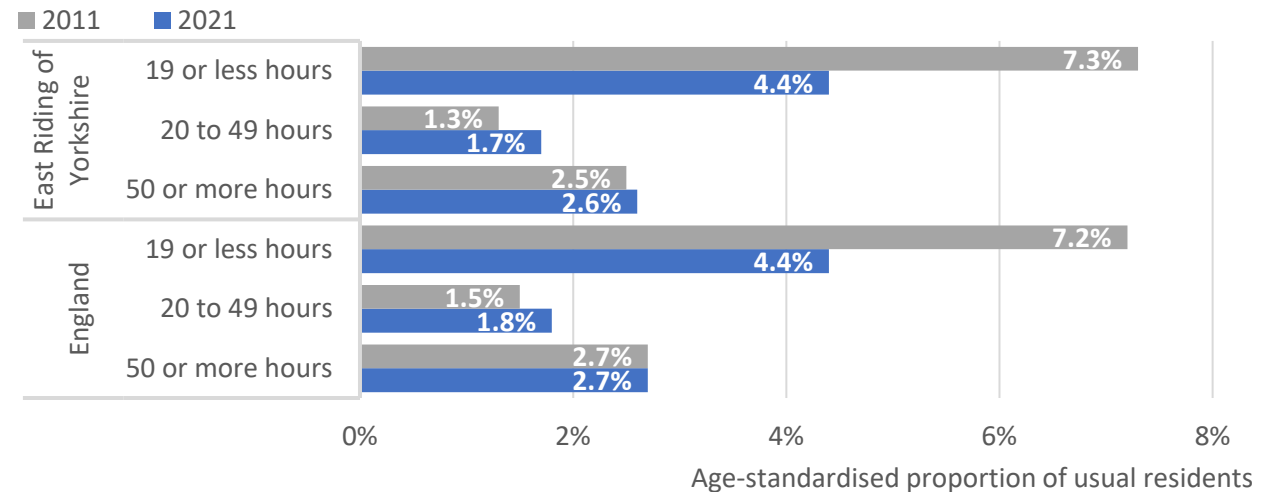


Figure 2: Number of hours of unpaid care provided per week, usual residents aged 5 years and over, age-standardised proportions, 2011 and 2021, East Riding of Yorkshire, and England

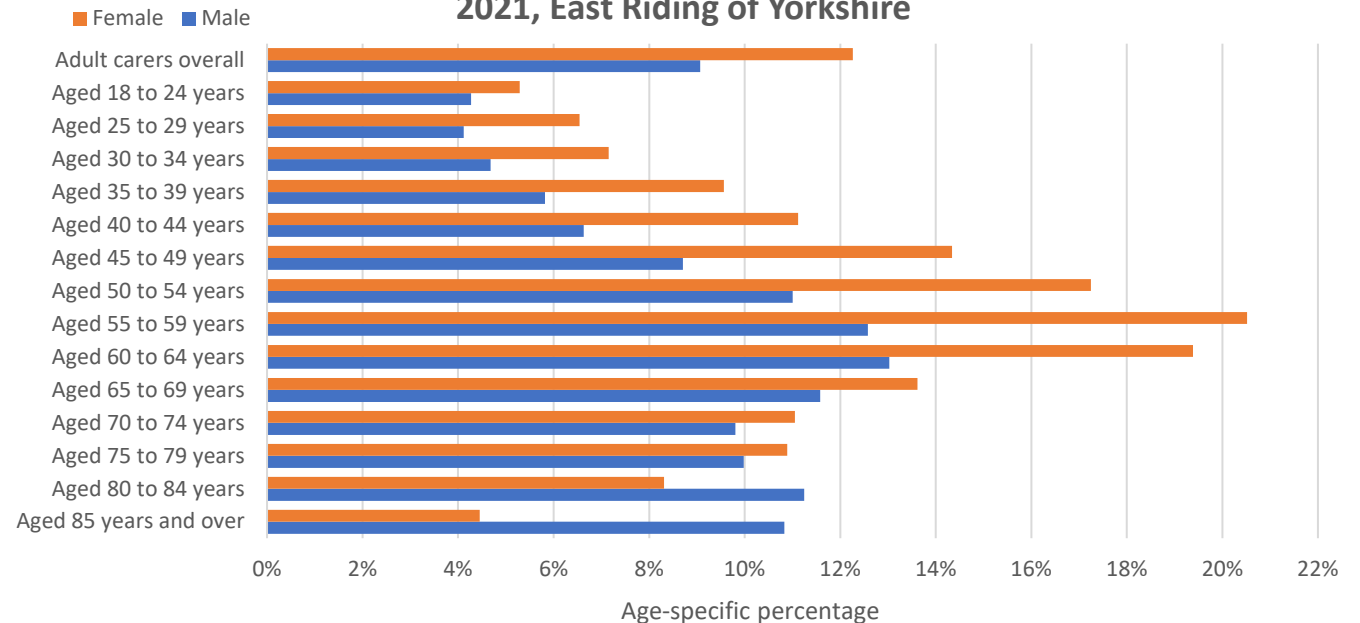


- 30,076 individuals aged 18 and over indicated they provided some form of unpaid care each week.
- This represented 98.2% of all individuals providing some unpaid care.
- 59% of carers were female, representing 12.3% of the female population. 41% of carers were male, representing 9.1% of the male population.
- 40% carers providing less than 50 hours of unpaid care a week were male, but this rose to 43% when providing more than 50 hours a week.
- The highest proportion of female carers were between the ages of 55 and 59 years (20.5%), and the highest proportion of male carers were between the ages of 60 and 64 years (13.0%)

- South East Holderness and Bridlington North have the highest count of carers, but compared to the other highest wards this is predominantly in those categories providing more than 20 hours a week of unpaid care.
- In South East Holderness, Bridlington North, Bridlington South, Bridlington Central and Old Town, and Goole South over 60% of carers are providing 20 hours or more a week. Across the whole of the East Riding of Yorkshire, this proportion is 50.6% of carers.
- Overall, the proportion of adults providing unpaid care is 10.7%. Bridlington North, South East Holderness, Bridlington Central and Old Town, North Holderness, Mid Holderness, East Wolds and Coastal have proportions statistically higher than this.

- There was a larger proportion reporting good health that didn't provide unpaid care. Conversely, a larger proportion reporting bad health did provide unpaid care.
- As the number of hours of unpaid care increased the proportion report good health decreased, with the portion reporting bad health increasing. However, this is also linked to there being a higher proportion in some older age groups providing more hours of unpaid care compared to younger age groups.
- A larger proportion adults reported being disabled under the Equality Act that provided unpaid care (27.9%) compared to the proportion that provided no unpaid care (20.5%).
- The proportion increased as hours of unpaid care increased also.

Figure 4: General health by provision of unpaid care per week, usual residents aged 18 years and over, proportions by category, 2021, East Riding of Yorkshire

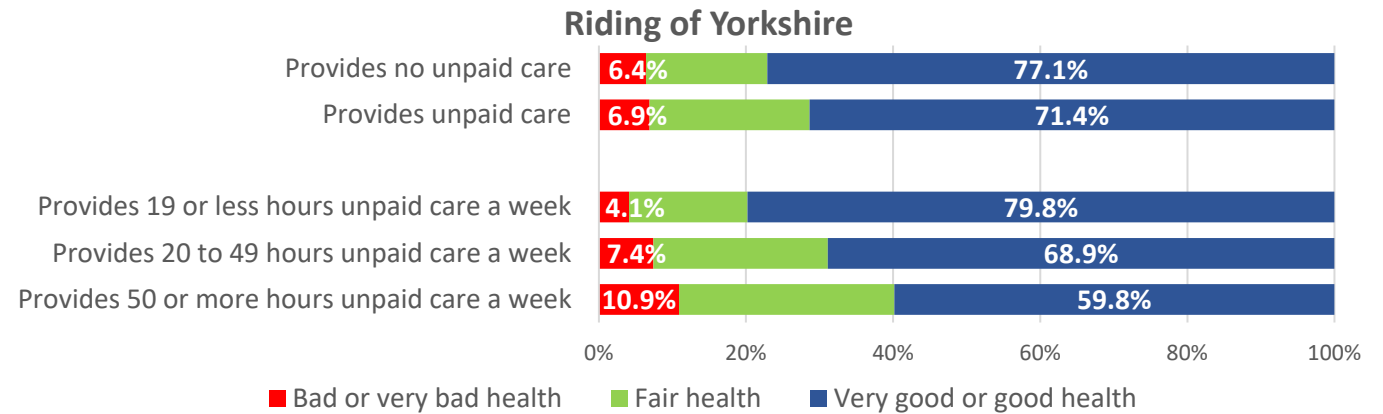
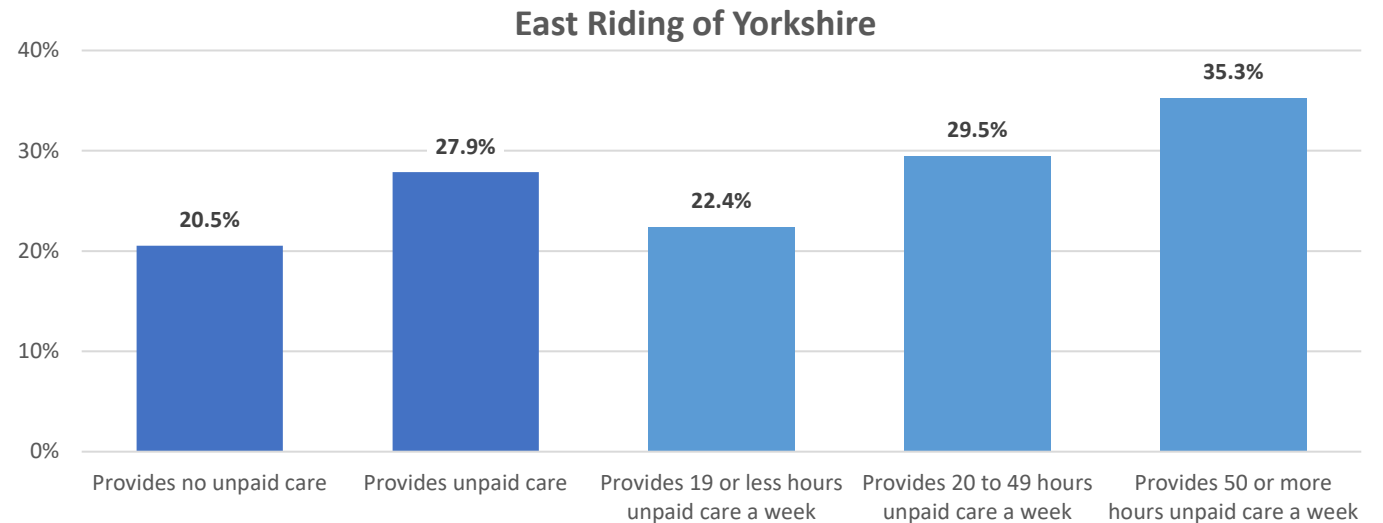


Figure 5: Disability reported by provision of unpaid care per week, usual residents aged 18 years and over, proportions by category, 2021, East Riding of Yorkshire
