East Riding of Yorkshire Young Carers Findings From Census 2021

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Defining young carers

Bernado's (2024) define young carers as "someone under the age of 18 who helps to care for a family member, relative or friend". As the 2021 Census excluded children aged 4 years and under from carers dataset, the information in this document will be for the 5 to 17 years age group.

Young Carers in the East Riding

In the East Riding on Census day, there were 547 young people providing unpaid care. This number represented 1.17% of the total East Riding population aged 5 to 17 years, which was significantly lower than the proportion recorded in England overall (1.37%).

Looking at specific age groups, 0.4% of those aged 5 to 9 years were providing unpaid care. There were 75 children in this age group, of which, 39 were aged 5 to 7 years.

The proportion increased to 0.9% for those aged 10 to 14 years and 2.7% for those aged 15 to 17 years. Unpaid care provided by those aged 10 to 14 was lower than the proportion seen across England and similar for those aged 5 to 9 years and 15 to 17 years.

Table I below provides a summary of counts of young carers by age groups.




Young carers area of residence

St. Mary's ward had the highest number of young people providing unpaid care (with a count of 35, see chart I) and Howden having the lowest (n=II).

Cottingham North had the highest percentage of their 5-17 population providing unpaid care (1.8%, see chart 2), in comparison Willerby and Kirk Ella which had the lowest (0.7%).

However, each ward had wide confidence intervals which made their proportions all statistically similar to the overall proportion of 1.17%.



Number of hours care provided

More than half of young people providing unpaid care were providing less than 9 hours per week (323 out of 547 persons), however there was still 119 of the 547 (over 20%) providing over 20 hours of unpaid care per week.

There were also more young people providing over 50 hours of unpaid care a week (38 persons) compared to those providing 35 to 49 hours (34 persons).



Number of hours care provided by age group

Chart 3, shows that older children reported providing a higher proportion of unpaid care in their age group, for each of the categories of hours per week, for example 1.55% of 15-17 years olds provided 9 hours or less unpaid care, as a percent of the total East Riding population aged 15-17 years. Table 4 provides the counts that make up these percentages.
